

## **Bob "Daddy O" Wade**



In January of 1980, the "boots" officially arrived in San Antonio. The "World's Largest Cowboy Boots" sculpture stands an impressive 35-feet, three inches tall. It is 30-feet long, nine-feet wide and weighs 10,000 pounds. But have you ever wondered about who created them? and why?.

#### **Artist**

Austin-born artist Bob "Daddy O" Wade was 36 years old when he was contacted in 1979 by the Washington Project for the Arts out of Washington, D.C. They asked him to create a Texas-themed sculpture to be featured in an empty lot near the White House. The late colorful artist Bob "Daddy-O" Wade created massive cowboy boots and our nation's capital got an up-close example that everything really IS bigger in Texas.

Wade is known for several other giant creations, including a 40-foot long iguana that sits atop the Ft. Worth Zoo. Wade also



created the dancing frogs on the roof of a Taco Cabana in Dallas and a 70-foot high saxophone in Houston. The boots were first featured in an empty lot that was only blocks away from the White House. Soon after the boots went on display in Washington, a bidding war began to bring the boots back to Texas. The then-owners of the North Star Mall outbid everyone else and purchased the boots for \$20,000.

#### **Journey to San Antonio**


The journey to get the boots to the Alamo City was not easy. When the structure was loaded on to three trailers, one trailer was too high, one was too wide and one was too long. One of the boots got stuck under an overpass during its road trip to its new home. The boots have become a popular tourist spot in San Antonio and upward of 200,000 cars pass by them daily on Loop 410. A documentary "Too High, Too Wide and Too Long" about Wade released in 1999.

## **Burns Night**



January 25 is the birthday of Scotland's most famous poet, Robert Burns (1759-1796). This date has become an occasion for Scots all over the world to gather together in his honor.

A Burns Night supper usually includes haggis, a traditional dish of the heart, lungs, and liver of a sheep or calf minced with

suet, onions, oatmeal, and seasonings. Burns's words, Fair fa' your honest, sonsie face, Great chieftain o' the pudding-race!" greets the dish's entry into the room.

Men wear kilts and women their tartan sashes, and the evening's celebration includes reading Burns's poems and singing his songs.

To close the celebrations guests usually stand, hold hands and sing the New Year's Eve staple, "Auld Lang Syne", before dancing and general merriment resumes. "Should auld acquaintance be forgot, And never brought to mind? Should auld acquaintance be forgot, And auld lang syne."

## **National Belly Laugh Day**

Laughter has been a topic of interest for most philosophers and thinkers throughout history. According to the ancient Greek writer Herodotus, laughter was mainly classified into three types: "those who are innocent of wrongdoing, but ignorant of their vulnerability," "those who are mad," and "those who are overconfident."

In the 20th century, Henri Louis Bergson, a French philosopher, published his work, "Laughter: An essay on the Meaning of the Comic." Ramon Mora Ripoll in his study which was named "The Therapeutic Value of Laughter in Medicine" believed that laughter had therapeutic and healing properties and could be used to treat certain ailments in patients. He believed that it was a tool to be shared, and also realized the importance of letting more people know about the benefits of laughter on the human body.

In 2005, Elaine Helle, a professional yoga teacher, came up with the idea of Belly Laugh Day to celebrate laughter. Elaine believed that we celebrated many things in life, such as love and gratitude, but we often neglect the importance of laughter. And thus, Belly Laugh Day was born on January 24.
